

# airport phrasal verbs

A phrasal verb is a special kind of verb in English. It is made by combining a verb (an action word) with one or more small words like up, off, in, on, out, or away. Together, they create a new meaning that is often different from the verb by itself.

Examples:

- Turn on: To make something start working (e.g., "Turn on the light.")
- Look after: To take care of someone or something (e.g., "I look after my little brother.")
